Students explore the phonetic sounds of English and Italian through the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA), gaining tools to interpret and perform sung texts accurately. Course materials include selections from art song and musical theater. Students engage in speaking and singing exercises to strengthen their diction and performance skills.

5. Demonstrate the rules of pronunciation in sung Italian
6. Sing one classical English song demonstrating correct diction
7. Sing one classical Italian song demonstrating correct diction

**E. Methods for Assessing Student Learning**

Methods for assessment may include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Quizzes and homework on IPA symbols
2. Transcriptions of performance song lyrics into IPA
3. In class readings of texts

4. Produce a written critique of performance songs demonstrating correct pronunciation of sung English and Italian
