This course is a survey of the scientific study of psychological disorders such as obsessive-compulsive disorder, depression, bipolar disorder, and schizophrenia. Topics include how people are diagnosed, possible causes of disorders, and research on the treatment of disorders.

- 7. Apply an understanding of reliability and validity to the evaluation of various assessment methods. (Goal 2a-d; Goal 5a)

- 8. Evaluate empirically validated treatments of specific psychological disorders. (Goal 2 ad; Goal 5a, 5c)
- 9. Explain important ethical considerations related to Abnormal Psychology, both in clinical practice and legal situations. (Goal 2a, 2c, 2d; Goal 5a, 5c; 7b, 7d)
- 10. Apply multicultural competencies and psychological constructs (diagnostic criteria, assessment approaches, clinical research and treatment approaches) to the interpersonal, intrapersonal and intercultural aspects of psychopathology. (Goal 2a-c; Goal 5a; Goal 7c)
- 11. Describe how diverse background and cultural beliefs influence our views about psychological abnormalities and our reactions to people with mental disorders. (Goal 2a- d; Goal 5b; Goal 7a)
- 12. Identify ways in which persons with disorders have suffered exclusion, economic discrimination, and disenfranchisement in American society. (Goal 2a-d; Goal 7b)
- 13. Identify common misconceptions about persons with disorders and how those have contributed to long-held stereotypes. (Goal 2a-d; Goal 7d)
- 14. Analyze one's own beliefs, attitudes, and behaviors about mental disorders. (Goal 2a-d; Goal 7c)
